Head Librarian

From WAGS Bylaws:

The **Head Librarian** shall perform the duties usually associated with the operation of a genealogical library. The Head Librarian is an elected member of the board and has voting privileges.

The bylaws provide for a library committee (Part IV, Section 1, 1), to be headed by the Library Chair, to "meet at least quarterly to ensure the genealogical library continues to operate for the membership. This committee will report to the board after each quarterly meeting or as needed."

Duties:

- 1. Coordinate and schedule librarians to cover the hours that the library is open to the public
- 2. Chair the Library Committee to help with the direction of the library and report to the board. Committee tasks should include:

Keep library acquisitions and accessions up to date (including family history donations). Budget concerns and suggestions for the library

3. Attend the board meetings and report monthly to the board.

Vice-President

From WAGS Bylaws:

The **Vice-President** shall perform the duties usually associated with the office <u>and</u> serve in the capacity of presiding officer in the absence of the President. The Vice President shall call the first meeting of the Nominating Committee each year. Also, the Vice-President shall serve as chair of that committee which best suits his or her abilities.



At the Library . . .

Your WAGS library is ever-changing! We now have **new tables** that are flexible enough to accommodate individual research on library days, and they easily roll

around to create a conterence table or classroom configuration. Our NCW resources are moving into the reading room to put them closer to our new tables and make it easier to see the titles from your research table. (Anyone out there want to help me make a map of the new library layout?)

Additionally, we completed reviewing the state bulletins from Kansas to Montana. Paper copies of those we found online will be available to members on **Tuesday, April 12**. Come in and pick up a bulletin or two—maybe a family clue is hidden inside . . . **Remember, the WAGS library will be closed on Saturday, April 16.**

The bulletin board is back! Now that the library is open, Mardi Scott is once again making it a more interesting place with her great bulletin boards. She chooses subjects that challenge her, so it educates both the maker and the viewer. In March she featured the Wellington Disaster as a tribute to long-time member Leilani Bangs who suggested it. Stop in and see how the library is changing, and be sure to see Mardi's work.





Some good stats . . .

In the library, for March of 2022, we had 52 visits to the library by 17 people. (During the last 7 months of 2021, there were 40 visits per month by 12 people.) There were 16 volunteers working in the library for a total of 141 hours. And we know that more hours were volunteered from home!

We're seeing quite an uptick in obituaries/document orders, ever since we fixed our links on Ancestry.com. It's rewarding to help far-away people with their NCW connections.



WAGS Facebook is humming . . .

Kris McGregor has created an exciting Facebook presence for WAGS by publishing old photographs from our archives. Her post of the Chiwaukum Hotel (from Fred

Pflugrath's collection) had 382 likes, 65 comments and 38 shares. The pictures of Lewis & Clark School (from our *History of the Wenatchee Schools* book) attracted many former Lewis & Clark scholars, with 243 likes, 56 comments and 22 shares. A postcard sent in 1907 showing the flume up Tumwater Canyon, carrying water to the Lamb Davis mill in Leavenworth (from Kris's brother's collection), garnered 198 likes, 16 comments and 19 shares. Each of these posts is being shared with other Facebook groups, giving us more connections and name recognition.

Vignette from WAGS' past . . .

The Appleland Bulletin was first published in March 1972. Before the internet was a thing, the Bulletin was the way WAGS communicated with other societies, and as individuals it was the only way we could reach far-away researchers for



assistance—this was done by submitting queries. (The December 1974 Saturday workshop was devoted to composing queries.) We started exchanging bulletins with other groups around the country until, in 1995, we were exchanging with 85 other societies—you can see them along the south wall of the library. Now, in 2022, we're finding that about a third of them are online, and so we are removing the paper copies —after offering them to WAGS members, of course! Oddly, our own Appleland Bulletin is not yet online—we'll have to put it on the list for digitizing.



On the website . . .

I have mentioned the new "Places to go... things to do" page that's under Members Only on the website at recent meetings, but I want to make sure you know about it, and I hope you are visiting it regularly. Every week, our secretary Lisa goes through the state genealogy notices (and other sources) and picks out

the cream of the crop for you so that you can be aware of all the programs happening in other societies around the region. With so many Zoom meetings taking place, you're sure to find things (many free!) to pique your interest.

Also under Members Only, visit the **WAGS 50th Anniversary—Member Comments**, and consider adding a remembrance of your own. The **Membership Meeting Highlights** contains handouts and recordings of recent WAGS meetings. For you policy wonks and number crunchers, there are the **WAGS Reports**, and the ever-entertaining **Articles and Bylaws**. Truly something for everyone.
