Thanks to **Shirley Acheson**, we have a new **1959 Chelan County Plat Map** to help you add the history of your ancestors' land or homestead to your family story.


Note: **The library will be closed from December 21 to January 4.** Our online databases are always available at <u>www.wags-web.org</u>.

No submissions from you this month, so I'll share a couple things:


San Francisco earthquake

I was visiting my brother recently, and he was reading *A Crack in the Edge of the World* by Simon Winchester, about the SanFran earthquake of 1906. My SIL dug out a copy of two letters written shortly after the quake from her great+ uncle and his wife who lived on Shrader Street. Their

house was intact, but like others who were so lucky, they took in the homeless. They had 21 people in their house and 4 camped out in the yard! They said abundant food was arriving daily by the wagon and train load, but clean water was difficult to come by. And they didn't dare cook any of this food because of persistent winds causing fire danger. They reported that everyone was good-natured, helpful to others, and hopeful that the city would be rebuilt quickly.







Clever freshmen at Waterville High School


